Sarah Mead teaches, performs, and proselytizes polyphony in the Boston area. The 2007 recipient of the Thomas Binkley Award from Early Music America, she is a professor at Brandeis University, where she directs vocal and historical instrument ensembles and teaches music history; she has also taught sixteenth-century theory and performance practice at the Longy School of Music. Her handbook on Renaissance theory is used in historical music programs around the country. Overseas she has performed and given master-classes, lectures, and workshops in Japan, Australia, New Zealand and the UK. She is former Music Director for Early Music Week at Pinewoods Camp and serves on the Boards of the VdGSA and EMA. She is a founding member and music director of Nota Bene Viol Consort.

For this second Play Day of 2019, Sarah will be presenting a session entitled, "Playing Around with Your Bow!" – more on this from Sarah:

In thinking about music for a large group to work on bowing, I found myself choosing a series of canons, so that we can all practice the same gestures together before making them into a piece of music . . . the title of our session [will be] "Playing Around with your Bow" (haha). Looking forward to making music with you all!

Review of our January 26th Play Day with Sarah Mead

Sarah Mead was both our presenter on Saturday, January 26th and our new Circuit Rider for the calendar year of 2019, teaching lessons over three days to 15 people who signed up for individual and coached group sessions.

Sarah is professor of music at Brandeis University in Boston, where she teaches early music ensembles, history of music classes and inspirational lessons to her students. She is also is an active performer on viols in many ensembles, famous for her own premier group called Nota Bene which performs on Renaissance viols, all made by Ray Nurse and with special bows made for the instruments which make a huge difference in how the instruments are played. She was also the music director of the Viola da Gamba Society of America for a six-year-period after Martha Bishop retired from that position after many years. With her broad knowledge and specialty in Renaissance music we benefited from her wealth of expertise on Saturday!

Sarah's gave us an extremely clear demonstration and practical application of Renaissance music theory. Our tonal harmonic scales of later periods were not known in the 16th century. We sang a hexachord, the foundational series of six ascending notes which provided the structure of music composition in the 16th century and tell us which mode we are in. The solmization of those hexachord notes, ut, re, mi, fa, sol, la, were learned by all students at that time. Stating on our familiar piano keyboard note middle C as" ut, "or "do", we see that the "scale" or "mode" has two whole steps and then a ½ step from E to F and then two more whole steps to get to "la". In former times a teacher taught singing of notes using a hand and fingers

to point to the syllables, dating as far back as Guido d'Arezzo in the 11th century. In the example of E to F half step the syllables would be mi and fa. Therefore, if another hexachord starts on a different note than our C on the piano the *do, re, mi, fa, sol, la* will place *mi* and *fa,* the half step, on different pitches than E and F. Voila, the mode is a new one, which by the placement of the half step may make the song feel cheerful or sad or full of angst.

Sarah had us all sing a tune and words of Psalm 114 in the Dorian mode beginning on D. The words about Israel coming out of Egypt and Judah becoming God's sanctuary were set in musical lines illustrating the strength of the Dorian hexachord or the sense of wandering through other note sequences. We followed this example with Sweelinck's Pseaume 114 in parts. Next a piece by Mattaeus Maistre, "Aus tiefer Not" on Psalm 130 in Phrygian, the third mode. This mode was thought to be melancholy and dangerous and could lead a person to become lost (or worse!). We played Lydian, the fifth mode, in a Lassus composition "Beau le cristal, "containing the tritone, corrected with a B-flat. We ended the morning session with Gussago's Sonata terzadecima 'La Badina' in Mixolydian mode, a G major. This was a cheerful part piece, expansive and giving of hope.

Sarah's morning presentation gave us all hope for better understanding of 16th century music which includes some of the most wonderful viol music available to us.

In the afternoon the attendance was far less than the 20+ people I counted in the morning, with Sarah coaching one group at each session. This makes for somewhat difficult arrangements of groups (so please plan on staying when you can!).

My next concert will be on Saturday, March 30 at 7:30 PM at Christ Episcopal Church! The program, named Joyne Hands, will be a program of Renaissance music.

I will be playing on a new viol built by Scott Smith and will be joined by Shulamit Kleinerman (violin), Miyo Aoki (recorder), Jonathan Oddie (keyboard) and Kevin Payne (Renaissance lute).


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Have you been meaning to pay your 2018-2019 PNV Dues? Janet Slack
