

The President's Message

Wow, did we ever have an outstanding visit from our Circuit Rider for 2020, Ros Morley! Ros gave private and ensemble lessons Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, and then conducted group reading sessions Saturday evening and Sunday morning. During the group reading sessions she also gave invaluable instruction about bow management with demonstration and practice. Be sure to take advantage of her return visit May 7-10; Ros will also be our Play Day presenters on Saturday, May 9. We have now settled on dates for her visits in the fall -- she will be here September 24-27 for her third Circuit Rider visit in conjunction with our September 26 Play Day and November 19-22 for her fourth Circuit Rider visit.



Our Play Day presenter for Saturday, March 7th, will be Erik Andersen. He was on the faculty of Conclave 2019 in Forest Grove, OR, and received outstanding reviews as an excellent teacher, so we look forward to his visit in March. See the more detailed write-up about Erik later in the newsletter.

Erik Andersen to Present at Saturday, March 7th Play Day

Erik Andersen is a graduate of the Aaron Copland School of Music at the City University of New York where he completed studies in modern cello under the direction of Marcy Rosen and additional studies in historical performance with Lisa Terry. He regularly performs on viola da gamba and baroque cello and enjoys teaching historical and modern strings in group and individual lessons with a focus on body learning and wellness adapted from the Alexander Technique, yoga and his own experience as a performer, teacher, and practitioner.

At age 16 Erik was invited to participate in a teaching internship program through the InterSchool Orchestras of

New York, and now has over ten years of teaching experience serving as music teacher and ensemble coach for students ranging in ages from 4 to 84 years old. As a current MA of Teaching candidate at the University of San Francisco, he is committed to facilitate the learning of all students and to promoting harmony and good-will in this world through teaching and music-making.

Erik's Play Day presentation will have him working closely with us throughout the day. We'll be starting in our Grand Consort session working on three madrigals by 20th-century Czech composer Bohuslav Martinů in the Czech (Moravian) language. Erik will help us understand the text setting and how we can approach diction on the viol. We'll then have two afternoon sessions, the first a session entitled, "Across the Fret Board" for all viols, and the second, a coached consort playing two settings of Psalm 121 (one from the Genevan Salter and the second by Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck (1562-1621).

Write-up of our January 25th Play Day with Mary Springfels

The January workshop was led by Mary Springfels. The morning session dealt with two settings from the Song of Solomon. Mary reminded us that the words should help us find the appropriate expression. The first selection, Anima Mea Liquefactus est, by Lasso, is a woman's voice. The bass and altus have a rather fluid run of quarter notes on the word liquefactus. Things get worse when she searches for her beloved and can't find him. The city guards beat her – the verb *percuserunt* could be emphasized by more percussive notes. After more insults from authorities, she calls upon the daughters of Jerusalem to tell her beloved that she's sick of love.

The second selection, Tota Pulchra es, by Heinrich Isaac, is more upbeat. A man's voice is praising his beloved. The phrases have been rearranged in a different order than the biblical text. The music is more complex. In the first selection, eighth notes are rare, only in pairs, often as a cadential ornament. In this second selection there are abundant eighth notes in a variety of figures. The piece is almost twice as long.

After lunch, the first coached session dealt with 6-part pieces by White, a Pavan and a Fantasia. The second session, which I expected to be at large, also turned out to be coached. We played a pavan by a German composer I'd never heard of, Johann Schop. Mary noted that Schop's life spanned the Thirty Years War, the destruction of which was comparable to the First World War. This pavan was more complicated than the one by White in the earlier session.

I must thank the members who doubled with me for this workshop. They enabled me to get back in after the many times I missed a few notes.

[Editor's Note: According to Wikipedia, Johann Schop lived 1562-1667, was a virtuoso violinist in his own right, composed books of 4-6 part violin music, and even J.S. Bach borrowed a melody of Schop's, *Werde munter, mein Gemüte*, which we know better today as *Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring*.]
