

## The President's Message

I hope that you all have had a great summer, despite the heat and smoke in August from the wildfires in Eastern Washington and British Columbia. I am happy to have the cool nights and warm days with clear skies that come with our fall weather. I just returned from a 15-day paddle trip on the Colorado River in the Grand Canyon, which was a phenomenal experience! Be sure to put that one on your bucket list!

With fall comes the first Play Day of the season, Saturday September 29. We are fortunate to have our former President and one of our favorite presenters, Lee Inman, for our morning group session and afternoon coached consorts. His topic will be "Overthinking the Bow". Based on our very successful experience with the VdGSA half circuit rider program for 2018 with Mary Springfels as our Play Day presenter in January and May, the PNV board has decided to apply for the full circuit rider program for 2019. Ellen Seibert has volunteered to coordinate that activity for PNV. If we are successful in our application, Sarah Mead will be our circuit rider for 4 sessions. Two of those would be as our Play Day presenter in January and March 2019. The other two sessions would be independent of Play Days at times that work for her schedule. This will allow us to still have three different presenters for the remaining Play Days of 2019, as we feel it important to have a wide variety of presenters for our Play Days. A key benefit of the full circuit rider program is that it ensures we have a consistent teacher available 4 times in 2019 for those who want to take advantage of individual and/or consort lessons and classes with that person. ## Lee Inman to present at September 29th Play Day!

PNV's first Play Day of the 2018-2019 season will see the return of one of our perennial favorites, Lee Inman, who will conduct a session entitled "Overthinking the Bow". Lee is still choosing the pieces he will be presenting, and we'll be sure to forward them for your review prior to Play Day, if possible!

Composer, arranger, lecturer, teacher, and ensemble coach, Lee has played baroque cello and viola da gamba for over forty years. During his university years, Lee felt drawn to the viol, and was primarily self-

taught, until a posting by the US Air Force to what was then West Berlin brought him under the guidance of Dr. Richard Klemm, of the Berlin Hochschule für Musik. In the mid-1970's, he both taught viola da gamba as a member of the adjunct faculty of the Cornish School, and performed on viol and Baroque cello with Randall McCarty, Steven Stubbs, Stanley Ritchie, and other Seattle early music pioneers, appearing regularly with the Seattle Bach Ensemble, Prackticall Musick and Fiori Musicali.

Later, while living in Minneapolis, he became a founding member of the Lyra Concert as its principal and solo cellist and gambist, and supported several of the Twin Cities' active early-music chamber groups as a continuo specialist. Lee returned to Seattle in 1990 and continues to participate actively in Seattle's ever-expanding early-music scene.

Lee is a popular leader at Pacific Northwest Viols Play Days, and at summer workshops in Arizona and Washington. He has presented in master classes with Anner Bylsma, Jeanne Lamon, and Laurence Dreyfuss. He has also appeared in concert with Jack Ashworth, Julie Jeffries, Mary Springfels, Craig Trompeter, and Brent Woznick, as well as with Margriet Tindemans, Olga Hauptman and other notable Northwest performers and teachers.

Below is a bit more about Caroline in her own words – and if you are anything like me, you'll probably have all kinds of questions for Caroline after reading it! I am originally from Winnipeg, Manitoba, and I've been a cellist for as long as I can remember. Sometime during my undergraduate cello studies, I was introduced to the recordings of gut string masters like Anner Bylsma and Jordi Savall. The richness of colors immediately drew me in, and I ended up developing a strong desire to make these kinds of sounds for myself. I went to The Juilliard School to study

Baroque Cello performance with Phoebe Carrai. I was still too musically curious when I graduated from there, so I subsequently went on to study with Paolo Pandolfo and Christophe Coin at the Schola Cantorum Basiliensis in Basel, Switzerland. When I haven't been studying, I've been either performing wherever I'm asked, or researching music in the comfort of my home. I've just finished my studies abroad, and I am now settling down in the Seattle area with my husband, a lutenist and Seattle native. I'm thrilled to be coming into this wonderful community!

## Concert Recap – The Golden Lagoon: Renaissance Concert at Christ Episcopal on August 15th

We wanted to program music that would show the qualities each instrument could bring to the table, both in solo and chamber settings. The combination of Renaissance traverso, gamba, and lute makes for a lovely sound, and it unfortunately doesn't get programmed very frequently. After reading a variety of music, the distinct emotional language of Italian repertoire quickly won, so we decided to construct a program on Venetian-themed music, "The Golden Lagoon".



The backbone of the program consisted of diminutions on famous madrigals: Vincenzo Bonizzi's *Doulce Memoire* for viola bastarda, Giovanni Bassano's diminutions written over de Rore's madrigal, *Non è ch'il duol mi scem*, Palestrina's *Pulchra es amica mea*, and Ortiz's settings of Arcadelt's four-voice madrigal *O felici occhi miei*.

The rest of the music was fell under the category of "stuff we really, really like". This included Bartolomé de Selma y Salaverde's *Canzon a doi Basso e soprano no. 12* (fantastic fugue with a written-out echo effect), Adam Jarzębski's *Venite exultemus* (beautiful themes), and lute music of Simone Molinaro and Giovanni Battista Dalla Gostena. To highlight the lively dance culture of the time, we closed with a set of dances by Giorgio Mainerio

This was our first time playing in Christ Episcopal Church, and we were blown away by its lovely acoustic. Also, despite the mid-August heat on a Wednesday night, we were greeted by an enthusiastic and sizable crowd. It was a wonderful way to say "hello" to Seattle, and we have already begun planning for more concerts next year.
