

## The President's Message

What challenging times—the COVID-19 pandemic, the Black Lives Matter protests, and now catastrophic wildfires in California, Oregon, and Washington State! Despite our hope of having an in-person Play Day for our opening Play Day of our 2020-2021 season, we are still in the midst of the pandemic. So, our September 26th Play Day will be held virtually, with Ros Morley as our teacher. Here are Ros' words about what she is planning: "I am preparing a lot of duets, looking at French music in 2 parts from Machaut and/or Dufay through to the 18th century. The music [will] be of varying difficulty, so something for everyone, I hope. I'm thinking of calling the sessions 'Douce Mémoire/Sweet Memories'...".



Ros has agreed to provide the music and a recording of each of the two lines of the duets by September 18 in order for you to have a chance to practice the music ahead of time, as well as to have the music to practice afterwards. Ros will be instructing us on how to play along with her or play music "minus one" with her during the Play Day session. You will be able to choose your favorite instrument to play along—treble, tenor, or bass.

We will be using Microsoft Teams, which is similar to Zoom, for the online session. Michael King, our Microsoft guru, will be providing instructions and technical support for getting online. He will send out a link for access, and we plan to allow everyone to get online at 9:30 a.m., 30 minutes before the start time of 10 a.m., in order to make sure everyone gets connected and also to have some chat time to get reacquainted.

Ros is our Circuit Rider for 2020, and she will be providing online lessons Friday, September 25-through Sunday, September 27, similar to her last session in May. You will be able to sign up for lessons for you and/or your consort with SignUpGenius; Michael will be sending out information for signing-up shortly! Ros is also scheduled for her fourth Circuit Rider virtual lessons November 20th-22nd, giving you the opportunity for continuity of lessons. Since the VdGSA has postponed the official Circuit Rider program for 2021 until further notice, Ros has agreed to be our

# A review of the 58<sup>th</sup> VdGSA Conclave: Family Affairs 1<sup>st</sup> VdGSA Nonclave

I will at last get my report to you on my experience with Nonclave. Each weekday there was a class from 11 to 12:30 Pacific Time. These were done over Zoom, and there were usually 80 to 120 students in a class. Most of the time, during the class, students were muted, with the line being unmuted at the end for asking questions. There was also an ongoing instant messaging chat during the class where people could ask questions as the class proceeded. There was an assistant/tech manager for each class, along with the instructor -- this person was usually one of the faculty who were more tech-savvy. They would save up the questions that came in on the chat, and those questions would be asked at the end of the section.

The class where I was able to do the most playing was my first one, with Larry Lipnik. As had been the case with the Cascadia Viols-sponsored workshop with Ros Morley a few weeks earlier, Larry played first the tenor part, then the bass part to a number of duets by Coprario, Morley, Gastoldi, and Lassus. His sound would come over the speakers and I would play the other part. With all participants muted, this worked well both with for both the session with Ros and with Larry.

The next day, we explored settings of "Coment Peult" from the 15th and 15th century to the present with Martha Bishop. We had scores of the music and could play along, but somehow that day I mostly just listened. Wednesday, I took Joanna Blendulf's class which was a technique class. She had a handout with a lot of two-bar repeated exercises based on figures found in the consorts of Matthew Locke. This was another day that I played a lot.

Pat Neely gave a class about the relationship of the Arnold Dolmetsch revival of the viol to the Arts and Crafts Movement – Dolmetsch's friendship with William Morris and poet Ezra Pound. She did a lot of multi-media stuff – it was the most ambitious presentation I saw all week in that respect, and it didn't all come off as planned, Playing MP3 files over Zoom didn't seem to work very well, and again that day, there wasn't much playing, even though the presentation was fascinating. It was a refreshingly different class and I learned a lot!

My last class was with Catherina Meints on diatonic fingerings on treble, and she started with a bunch of finger exercises (which are posted on the VDGSA website in the teaching videos) and they were wonderful. My hands felt as if they were glowing after I went through those exercises. Then we did exercises on the fingerboard. She had given us the diatonic fingerings for several well-known passages in consort music, but we didn't have much time to play in class. Still a very interesting and valuable class.

For additional playing, there were extra 'music minus one' MP3 files made available to attendees. We were able to download them too, so I can try some in the coming weeks. They are of varying quality. There was a lot of interest during the week in what microphones faculty were using, and I will be asking to see in coming newsletters some articles about using the computer to do one's own duets, or even one's own music minus one stuff.

The opening 'ice cream social' and closing 'banquet' were done over Zoom as well, and for the banquet we were put into breakout rooms with smaller numbers of people to help us converse.

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You were broken out with randomly chosen people, so that was only a pale substitute for sitting at a table with friends. The last part of the banquet and all the evening programs were presented over VdGSA's YouTube channel. There was a free evening and an auction night – I bought a mask made by Martha Bishop with viol-patterned fabric!

The first evening featured a talk by Loren Ludwig. He spoke about the viol as social media and in particular as a way for Catholic people to commune with each other in England during the time when being Catholic could land you in real trouble. I didn't retain a lot else from that lecture, but that's because it was early in the week. There was a concert by Lyracle, a voice and viol duo. Friday the lecture was on "The Family of Man", by Pat Neely. There were many slides on various black musicians who were in various courts and fine families during Medieval and Renaissance times. She also talked a lot about the difference between 'inclusion' and 'assimilation'. Somehow I found myself thinking a lot about the difference between thinking in stereotypes "a woman will have these interests and look as much as possible like this" and considering every person as an individual with their own interests, background, and appearance.

In addition, there were several offerings available over YouTube that attendees could watch during the week. I think these are going to be permanently put on the VDGSA website after Conclave and they are all worthwhile. Catherina Meints recorded a program of duets and trios (pre-COVID) using historic viols of English, German, Italian, and French origin from the Caldwell Collection, playing music from the country from which they hail. She made the video for the Oberlin BPI, and it is very well produced. It contains lovely close-up shots of the decoration on the various instruments and the sound is quite good.

Wendy Gillespie gave a lecture/concert on the music of Alexander Agricola, and that was extremely enjoyable as well. David Ellis created a timeline of English composers who wrote for the viol alongside the concurrent political and cultural events. As I mentioned, all of these things will be available on the VdGSA website soon. So how did I feel on Sunday after it was over? I had a real letdown feeling, because, I finally realized, I hadn't actually had a conversation with anyone all week. So, I called a few people, and made a resolution, if I attend Conclave online again, to phone one other participant each

day, just to have a conversation! The Nonclave was great and a tremendous bargain at \$105. But it couldn't approach what you get at an actual workshop. Still, it was great to see people's pictures who were participating. Others from here whom I noticed in attendance were Nancy Wright, Bill Warren, and Ellen Seibert. Janet Loy was there, as well as several people I knew from back East!

Sometimes, at the end of a Zoom event, people would stay on for a while and talk to each other. That was fun even if you were listening in. Lots of people's hair was longer. One did get a sense that 'we're all going through this together.' I'll be surprised if they don't end up including some classes of this sort in Conclaves to come. This would certainly be nice for

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people who find it difficult to travel cross-country. The VdGSA is hoping to hold next year's Conclave at Miami University, where it was to have been this year, in Ohio. So that will mean one year longer until it is back on the West Coast. Expenses are going up for the facilities, and probably even more in the future as colleges are hurt financially by COVID. So, I am glad to see there are online possibilities, and I'm sure they will get more and more adept at using the platforms in years to come.
