

May 7 Play Day: It's a Springtime Ferrabosc-off!

This is what you get for hiring a lute player! Ferrabosco the Elder is one of very few composers to have written both for viols and for solo lute, and as such, he's an easy gateway for me, a mere chord-strummer, into the rarefied world that you lucky consort-playing people inhabit. More than one lutenist has complained that much of Ferrabosco Sr.'s lute music is awkward and difficult, and this has led some to surmise that his most challenging solo lute works may in fact be arrangements of otherwise lost consort music, so if you misbehave, I may make you play some lute music...

My approach as a coach and teacher is generally naïve and sentimental—I have only a vague notion of how bows work or what rosin is for, but I believe that the bone-simple strong-weak mechanics of Renaissance music belie the all-encompassing poetics that perfect counterpoint can entail. Maybe that's a little abstruse, but the point is that we'll have plenty to talk about and I can't wait to hear you all.

JOHN LENTI specializes in music of the seventeenth century and has made basso continuo improvisation on lute, theorbo, and baroque guitar the cornerstone of a career that encompasses work with baroque and modern orchestras, chamber music, recitals, and opera. Recent highlights have included performances with the Metropolitan Opera, Baroque Music Montana, Acronym, Tesserae, and the Seattle and Oregon Symphonies. He has played at early and modern music festivals in Boston, Berkeley, Indianapolis, Bloomington,

Costa Rica, Vancouver, Carmel, Utrecht, the Proms, Aldeburgh, Valletta (Malta), and the San Juan Islands. He has made some well-regarded recordings with groups like Acronym, Wayward Sisters, Musica Pacifica, and Ostraka and he has played with most early music groups of note in North America. John was born in Greenwood, South Carolina. His parents were a touring piano duo and he traveled with them as a kid as they performed around the Deep South, thereby gaining an appreciation of the role of classical musicians as bearers of comfort and truth. He went to North Carolina School of the Arts and Indiana University and studied lute with Nigel North, Jacob Heringman, and Elizabeth Kenny. Based in Seattle, John is director of the New Baroque Orchestra, a wonderful community baroque orchestra*, and he frequently coaches and accompanies Shula Kleinerman's outrageously gifted bands of kids.

Rental Program Receives New Treble Viol

The Pacific NW Viol Society has run a thriving rental program thanks to the loans and donations of instruments from its members and friends. The most recent donation is a lovely treble from Linda Carlson.

Linda moved to the area in 1989 from southern California. She had worked in the grocery industry for many years before getting a master's degree in the field of mental health. With a change of career and a wish to be closer to her brother she shipped her sailboat up to the Everett Marina and moved into it.

One day, Linda happened to purchase a gift for her niece: a little "dime store" recorder attached to a lesson book. Linda says she had no prior music-playing experience, but before the time came to actually give her niece this gift, Linda had opened it and was drawn in! After a period of time teaching herself from the little book, she went to the Music Center of the Northwest and joined a beginners' class taught by Kim Pineda.

The following summer she attended the Seattle Recorder Society workshop at Pt. Townsend and later on at an RSR meeting was tempted by PNV member, Peter Stewart, to try the viola da gamba. She rented a treble and worked alone for six months before deciding to get her own instrument and take lessons. Her first teachers were Ron Fullerton and Elisabeth Reed. After switching from treble to bass she switched back to treble and purchased the Chinese instrument from the Boulder Early Music Shop.

When the logistics of commuting to Seattle proved daunting, and, not finding other gambists in Everett, Linda began to drift away from the consort life. She started a senior recorder group called "The Everett Recorder Players +" (The plus sign indicated the

possibility of other instruments joining in, including herself on the treble viol.) The group met twice a month for 11½ years, and for many of those years performed at Christmas time in the UW Bookstore at Mill Creek.

With her treble spending too much time in the case in recent years, Linda decided that rather than sell the instrument, she would donate to our worthy cause! It is a large model with an unusually warm tone. Another asset of this instrument is that it has been set up by Scott Smith with geared pegs.
